Successful Working at Home Strategies

Tip 1: Timetable the learning day


Stick to a routine, this will provide structure to the day. We

Create your learning timetables, basing these on your school timetable. Use the following criteria to help you:

- Set achievable but challenging goals.
- Include all subjects across the week.
- Include a range of subjects in one day.
- Space out learning, with subject disciplines interleaved.
- Include breaks and planned rest time.

Set goals at the start of each day so that you know what you are working towards and in order to motivate you. And at the end of the day, get them to review if they have successfully met their aims. This could include a "reward" – such as their choice of film to watch as a family that evening.

Finally, factoring in breaks is key. Do not underestimate the importance of this. It will enable them to avoid cognitive overload and support wellbeing. Remember, this is not school and during the current crisis family time and time for discussion and talking will be essential.



Tip 2: Create the perfect learning environment

The learning environment is just as important.

- Create a comfortable but studious space, free from distractions (such as televisions, consoles etc).
- Limit distractions: Put phones away while working. If you are using them for online resources or research then do so for some periods, but then to take a break during other periods.
- Equipment: Make sure you are equipped for study and not having to stop your work to search for stationery.







Write your own Historical Fiction Competition 2020 from the Historical Association

Students can set their stories in **ANY*** period or place in the past, so the story can fit in with and extend any historical topic you may be studying. Winning students will each receive a cash prize of £25 and an engraved Bath Aqua Blue glass paperweight.

- 1. Across Years 7, 8 and 9 there will be three prizes for the best individual story. Individual stories indicate a story written by an individual student who is part of a whole class or year group who are all writing historical stories.
- 2. Across Years 10,11, 12 and 13 there will be three prizes for best individual story.
- 3. There is also a prize for the best fictional historical character in a convincing historical setting. Three prizes will be on offer here across all year groups.

What are the judges looking for?

Stories in each category are shortlisted by panels of student readers. The shortlist is then judged by our primary and secondary expert panels. Judges are looking for:

- **Historical accuracy** even down to the choice of names characters are given and any props additional to the historical setting
- A riveting read with a good plot!
- A convincing story i.e. is it plausible that these events and/or this character could have existed at the time?
- Use of historical knowledge to feed the plot, context and character
- Effective use of historical vocabulary and literary conventions, including where dialogue is included in the story
- Creative and interesting perspectives of story-telling. In the past we have received an entry telling the story of a siege from the perspective of the castle!

Entries must be received by Friday 26 June 2020.


