GCSE Courses



- Graded 9-1
- Assessment is usually terminal in the form of examination papers
- There is a coursework component in a minority of subjects, which is usually completed under controlled conditions
- Require large bulks of knowledge to be recalled and understood







Vocational Courses

- Graded using a vocational system (Distinction*, Distinction, Merit, Pass), one vocational grade is equivalent to a GCSE
- Assessment is usually a combination of portfolio work and examination papers
- Often work-related, and are valued by further education institutions and colleges



Curriculum Routes

The desire of the government is to ensure both balance and academic rigour. The aim is to produce well rounded students, with skills in a broad range of curriculum areas.





Why Ebacc?



HELP YOUR CHILD MAKE THE BEST GCSE CHOICES

You and your child may currently be considering, with advice from their school, what GCSE subjects they should take next year.

The Department for Education recommends these core subjects, which make up the English Baccalaureate (EBacc), and help keep options for young people open:

- English language and English literature
- Maths
- Combined science or 3 single sciences from Biology, Chemistry, Physics, and Computer science
- History or Geography
- A language Ancient or modern

WHAT IS THE EBACC?

The EBacc is not a qualification in its own right - it's a combination of GCSE subjects, including a language, that offer an important range of knowledge and skills to young people.

EBACC FUTURE PROOFS YOUR CHILD'S PROSPECTS

While your child may not have decided on their future career path yet, choosing the EBacc at GCSE gives them access to a full range of employment options when they leave secondary school and the broad knowledge that employers are looking for

If they are thinking of going to university, the EBacc is also recommended by Britain's most prestigious universities.

LANGUAGES GIVE YOUNG PEOPLE A COMPETITIVE EDGE

Languages are an important part of EBacc. Studying a foreign language can be extremely rewarding and exciting. They provide an insight into other cultures and can open the door to travel and employment opportunities. They can also broaden pupils' hortzons, helping them flourish in new employments.

If your child finds languages difficult, don't forget that they will have been studying them for much less time than their other subjects and, while it can be a challenge, learning a language will greatly enhance their future opportunities.

What's more, we know that employers value languages, as they are increasingly important to make sure we can compete in the global market. Because of this, languages are increasingly becoming a requirement for many graduate schemes, such as those offered by Lidi.

WHAT ABOUT ARTS AND MUSIC?

While arts and music are not included in the EBacc, every child should still experience a high-quality arts and cultural education throughout their time at school as part of a balanced curriculum. If your child can take 9 GCSEs, they will have either 1 or 2 further options and can choose subjects based on their wider interests like art or music as well as others such as physical education or technology.

The Building Careers
Programme



<u>Background</u>

- Rising housing costs.
- The Government has set an ambitious target to build 300,000 homes annually by the mid-2020s.
- The shortage of workers with relevant skills is one of the main constraints to increasing the pace of housing delivery in the UK.



Sunderland council has developed proposals with Sunderland College and the Ministry of Building Innovation and Education to create a £20 million state of the art industry-leading education and skills academy – Housing Innovation & Construction Skills Academy (HICSA).

Housing Innovation & Construction Skills Academy












The HICSA will promote the use of modern methods of construction in the delivery of high-quality new homes.

The vision

- Opportunity for our students to gain essential Construction and Digital skills, putting them on the front foot with the region employers, and help close the skills gaps in the construction sector.
- This pioneering partnership between an FE college and school The Building Careers Programme.
- Equipping the region's young talent with the academic and practical skills needed to progress into relevant careers in the Construction employment sector
- Next generation of Construction Managers, Surveyors and Architects.
- Partners who have already committed to the programme include Sir Robert McAlpine, and Faithful and Gould.



Cohort

- The group is to be made up of 12-15 pupils exclusively from St. Wilfrids in Year 10.
- 3 days at St. Wilfrid's RC College
 - Monday, Wednesday and Thursday 08:40 to 15:10
 - GCSE's in...English Language, English Literature, Maths, Combined Science, Geography or History.
- 2 days at Sunderland College
 - Tuesday and Friday 08:45 to 15:10.



Qualifications

- Year 10 BTEC Level 2 Tech Award in Construction and the Built Environment (1x GCSE equivalent)
- Year 11 City & Guilds level 2 Technical Award in Constructing and Maintaining the Built Environment (1x GCSE equivalent)

Pupils build up a BCP Digital Passport identifying all the digital aspects and skills that the pupils have used over the two years including:

- Time spent in the 360° Immersive Hub
- A demo and sessions on how drones are used in construction
- Sessions on elementary Building Information Modelling (BIM)
- Use of 3D printing and robotics in construction.

The increased element of Digital Construction leads seamlessly to progression into further and higher education, apprenticeships and employment.

Whilst at Sunderland College...

Within the two days at Sunderland College:

- Tutorial session
- Sports Leaders Award
- Employability skills sessions including:
 - Project work
 - Interview preparation / practice skills
 - CV writing
 - Careers advice / research techniques
 - Visits / External speakers
 - Work Experience preparation.
- A designated area for the 14-16 learners to go during social times.
- School pastoral systems still apply at the college (Behaviour/attendance).
- Travel Travel costs paid by school as long as pupils have POP card.
- Uniform STW uniform in school / BCP Workwear at Sunderland College

To this end, through careful assessment and evaluation, we will steer the students towards a path that fulfils this aim. We use a range of data to support us in making this decision:

- Performance in languages
- Prior attainment
- KS3 modular assessments
- Performance in core subjects
- Professional judgement of teaching staff



Aspiration for all students at St. Wilfrid's

- A minimum of 5 grades at or above level 5 or equivalent including English & Mathematics
- Grade 6 or better in subjects that students wish to study at A-Level
- Merit or better in vocational subjects that students wish to study at A-Level

- You think you will enjoy them

- They link to a career aspiration that you have
- Will support you to continue studying post-16
- Will help you meet entry requirement for courses post-16
