Curriculum Intent

Equip students with the knowledge to engage with contemporary society and respect social diversity. Allowing students to examine how individuals, communities, and organisations engage with religion in addition to supplying them with the critical thinking skills to understand and question their identity, roles and responsibilities within society.

Learning outside of the classroom

All students are provided with homework to extend and consolidate their learning. Students will complete flipped learning, retrieval activities and exam practice questions, alongside a range of wider academic reading. Students at this level are also expected to complete independent study using extra readings provided by the department.

Academic Reading

Academic reading is an essential component of a sociological education. It enables pupils to better understand the applicability of theory and recognise sociological occurrences in their day-to-day lives. It will also allow them to develop subject knowledge and gain a range of skills that are difficult to develop in the classroom. Recommendations for wider academic reading will be provided throughout the course.

Curriculum Intention:

- Understand and evaluate sociological methodology and a range of research methods through active involvement in the research process
